One of the most, if not the most well-known class of US aircraft carriers is the Essex Class. They are famous for their incredible service from WWII, Korea and into the Vietnam era before finally being replaced by today's super carriers. Their length of service from the likes of Hellcats to Crusaders to recovery of Mercury-Redstone, Gemini and Apollo space missions encompasses numerous post WWII modifications, variants, and conversions. It takes an expert to know the history of the class from beginning to end.

We are fortunate to have one of those experts in our chapter. Ben Hardaway led a very informative discussion on the evolution of the class and gave us a course on accurately modeling them in a variety of scales. Ben brought some examples of the challenges in the different kits and the amount of work it takes to address fit issues. 




The Kliment Voroshilov (KV) tanks are a series of Soviet heavy tanks named after the Soviet defense commissar and politician Kliment Voroshilov who operated with the Red Army during World War II. The KV tanks were known for their heavy armor protection during the early stages of the war, especially during the first year of the German invasion of the Soviet Union.

In certain situations, even a single KV-1 or KV-2 supported by infantry could halt German formations. The German Wehrmacht at that time rarely deployed its tanks against KVs, as their own armament was too poor to deal with the "Russischer Koloss" – "Russian Colossus".

The Germans captured some of the KV-2's, (as well as other abandoned Russian tanks/artillery pieces) and modified them with German accessories (commanders' cupola), lighting, etc.) and used them in special companies, like the Pz.Abt.66 for the invasion of Malta.

Scott built both of the KV-1s seen below. His kit OOB winner represents an older version KV-1 (Tamaya Kit) pulling up to a captured and modified KV-2- showing that it has been "Re-Captured" in running order, (Dragon kit). The units these tanks belong to are not known.





The Panzer IV could well be described as the workhorse of the German Panzer arm.

Classed originally as a close-support tank for panzer regiments its short, stubby 75mm gun fired high explosive and smoke rounds as required. At around 18 tons it was the heaviest front-line tank in German service at the outbreak of war but, apart from the suspension, bore a strong family likeness to the Panzer III. Various improvements were introduced over the years but the most significant, dating from the winter of 1941/1942, was the fitting of the much longer 75mm KwK 40 which, at a stroke, made the Panzer IV one of the most powerful tanks on the battlefield.








### Hague's Corner Snake Bite! by Dick Hague


Editor's note: Dick shares a unique running text and visual diary of his modeling adventures which includes triumphs, defeats, lessons learned and tips. It is too tall of an order to pull together one complete build from the various messages, so what you are seeing in these articles is a moving "window" of Dick's modeling adventures over time. Nevertheless, we are getting a host of tips and lessons learned suitable for beginners and experienced modelers alike.

Tip alert! No, it's not fang puncture wounds on my knee but a piece of masking tape that just had several thin brass instrument panels removed from it after they had been spray painted black (Figure 1). Later the unpainted back side of the brass panel will be coated with PSA, Pressure Sensitive Adhesive, and a carefully aligned with the holes in the brass, photo negative of the gauges will be pressed against the brass. It will look like the instrument panels now have numbers and lettering inside.

The next two pictures show what has been biting on me the last two modeling sessions. If it wasn't enough dealing with four Kingcobra kits last week I had to try and restart a pair of the predecessor Airacobras (Figures 2 and 3). The two pictures of taped Airacobra fuselages isn't to facilitate the two halves coming together but rather to hold in alignment the interiors while the glue gets really hard (Figure 4). Saturday's modeling on the pair ended the night with both interiors almost completely pulled out after getting put together during the day.






This Sunday's session involved removing a lot of molded on interior fuselage details and alignment fixtures as well as an almost total relocation of what got pulled out in an earlier night! Not only RS, but a few other brands lately have assumed you know what the kit designer was thinking when the instructions were drawn up. Not only were the kit instructions showing parts near but not touching parts they would go against, but also not telling that some parts needed to be reshaped by cutting! Here is a simple example of a before and after instrument panel that goes in the two-seat trainer version (Figure 5).



Remember the uncomfortable looking BR.20 crew members being painted from a previous update? They got some blue gray pants and yellow life vests (Figure 6).

Tip alert! Not having painted a group of crewmembers recently, I should have sprayed them entirely with a white primer making a second coat of yellow unnecessary as well as easier to paint the other colors!

This last two pictures (Figures 7,8, and 9) show the BR.20 nose masked off inside and out. You can see the sink mark on the side in Figure 7. Extra plastic inside making a 'shelf' to hold a later installed turret stayed hotter longer during the molding process and shrank the outside down. This taped together assembly was first sprayed the interior green color and then aluminum.



### IPMS Knoxville Smoky Mountain Model Con by Walter Schlueter

On May 20th, I had the good fortune to attend the IPMS Knoxville Smoky Mountain Model Con. My wife and I were on a vacation (Dollywood, Smoky Mountains, etc.) and the timing worked out perfectly. The Knoxville Scale Modelers Association has held this show for the last 40 years plus and according to their E-board the turnout this year was their most balanced and best show to date. The theme for this year's show was Vietnam.

The show was held in the gym of the Knoxville Catholic High School. The vendors were arranged around the perimeter of the room with the contest in the middle. I counted 16 vendors of which most were car vendors.

There were four rows of elevated tables to make it easier to see the models. The model turnout seemed good for a one-day show. There were mostly car models, and a good turnout of Gundams. The aircraft turnout (46 planes) was small with the junior entry having only one model. While I do not have specific numbers for attendees, below is a link to pictures of the contest entries. Afterwards, my wife and I had a chance to meet the Knoxville chapter president, and the chapter treasurer, for dinner

Being about an hour flight or an eight hour drive from the Washington DC area, this show is extremely doable for anyone who wants to attend from Washington DC and surrounding areas. I invited their board to attend our Model Classic next year on April 13, 2024.

The IPMS Knoxville Smoky Mountain Model Con is not to be missed. There are many things to do nearby, in Pigeon Forge, Gatlinburg and the surrounding areas that the whole family can make it a vacation.
