



The Real Thing

The Type 99 (Chinese: 99式主战坦克; pinyin: Jiǔjiǔshì Zhǔzhàn Tǎnkè) or ZTZ-99 is a Chinese third generation main battle tank (MBT).[6] The vehicle was a replacement for the aging Type 88 introduced in the late 1980s. The Type 99 MBT was China's first mass-produced third-generation main battle tank. Combining modular composite armor and tandem-charge defeating ERA, 125 mm smoothbore gun with ATGM-capability, high mobility, digital systems and optics, the Type 99 represents a shift towards rapid modernization by the PLA.

The Type 99 is based on the Soviet T-72 chassis. The tank entered People's Liberation Army (PLA) service in 2001. The People's Liberation Army Ground Force (PLAGF) is the sole operator of the Type 99. Three main versions of the Type 99 have been deployed: the Type 98 prototype, Type 99 and the Type 99A. The Type 99 forms the core of China's modern maneuver combat capabilities, with over 1,300 tanks built for the past two decades.

By 2008, 200 Type 98 and Type 99 tanks may have been deployed to the Beijing and Shenyang Military Regions. The Type 99 has seen less deployment than other tanks in PLA service due to cost factors. By 2024, more than 1,300 units of Type 99 and Type 99A have been deployed into the PLAGF service, forming the core maneuvering force of the PLA heavy combined arms brigades.






In getting back to the model desk after my cataract operations I came across the Amodel kit of this early WWII plane and decided to do a little work on it (Figure 2). Since I previously purchased a pre-cut mask for that huge number of panels in the cockpit canopy and the quality of the molding was way better than recent Amodel kits, I did a little work on it. Once I get some Japanese seat belts into the interior I will put that back in the box and try to complete some other models that have been hung up on the desk waiting for my vision to get cleared up a bit, and it has!

And a big public thank you to two good friends who took time out of their day to drive me to and from the cataract surgery in Fairfax during rush hour traffic. Both are animal lovers as I am, and both recently lost very old cats that had been long-term companions. Chris's cat outlived and survived twenty-one years with many dogs weighing three or four times his weight! While neither are scale modelers, both work on the 1/1 scale subjects that we modelers build replicas of. Chris restores classic automobiles and Gary built research aircraft and drones. The Marine UH-34 helicopter (Figure 4) needs a bit of detail painting to complete along with trying to get a decent orange yellow paint job on the cooling grills behind the rotor blades. It's not on in this picture.






This 1/48 scale Beechcraft UH-43 (Figure 5) is proving to be a kit that a lot of planning ahead is needed to successfully complete it. Unsatisfied with the quality of the clear plastic of the side windows, I cast them in place with clear epoxy. Right now the outside heat is precluding me opening the downstairs door to do any spraying outside. As soon as that sliding door opens an unbelievable amount of cold air flows outside! Not a time to be stressing our AC!.

The 'blue beast'! AJ 'Savage' (Figure 6) is slowly getting the already painted doors and landing gear doors and other small parts added. The props with white spinners have been painted but more work is needed on them to look right. Hopefully it won't require too much body putty to make them look decent.




Figure 8 shows a set of 1/48 scale wheels from a Beechcraft UC-43 light transport next to the fuselage of a 1/72 Spitfire to show how much difference the scales make!

Or "A Most Satisfying Method of Disposing of Captured Enemy Ordnance"



The several weeks of "Tet Offensive" that began on January 31st, 1968, stretched into months. And at Cu Chi, our friend Charlie and his NVA friends made it a point to continue dropping calling cards on us just about every night! Sometimes it was mortar fire, sometimes rockets, but we just could count on NOT getting a full night's sleep.

The troops out beating the bushes had a good deal of success finding Charles and even captured a number of their weapons. So many that, more than enough had been obtained for analysis back in the states, and for the dog-and-pony petting zoo of captured weapons kept for familiarization training of troops new to the theater.

Normally, excess enemy weapons would be handled by Explosive Ordnance Disposal specialists.

But then, somebody had the idea: "Why don't we just shoot it back at them?

An area to northeast of Cu Chi had been "free fire zone" since the war began. Known as the "Iron Triangle", it fit this free fire description:

- Anyone unidentified (which was everybody there) is considered an enemy combatant
- Soldiers were to shoot anyone moving around *without* first making sure that they were hostile.

It had been under communist control for the ENTIRE war ...French and American...back to the 1940's! So, why not just shoot the damn rockets back at ANYTHING in the Iron Triangle?


Bob Adams, an ordnance corps friend of mine told me about his little project, and I quickly joined him on his short junket to outside the bunker line on the northeast side of the Cu Chi base camp. I wouldn't have missed this for anything!

Bob is seen to the righ, setting up the tube launcher on its tripod. The troops had even captured the rather complex theodolite equipment used to precisely aim the launcher. (It is seen behind the launcher in the firing picture below.)

The rocket round is seen in the foreground. The dark part is obviously the business end: Bob said they figured the explosive equivalent to about our 8" artillery round. The silver part is of course the rocket motor.



This picture shows the 25th Division M*A*S*H triage center after a random (but direct) rocket hit. The "Dustoff" medevac helicopter pad is at right. Fortunately, it had been a quiet night, and nobody was in the building when it hit.



At the base of the rocket were three fins, curved to match the rocket tube, and held closed tightly against the rocket motor by clips. They are arranged so that on launch they immediately flip out to spin-stabilize the round.

It was all very simple, but the VC made it even simpler. We were told that they usually didn't even lug the launcher around, instead making a simple bipod of bamboo poles, and letting fly with it that way. It wasn't a precision weapon, and the Cu Chi base camp was so bigabout a mile squarethat they could hardly miss it entirely!

In the picture at lower left, you'll note the metal poles supporting concertina wire in the cleared fire zone outside the bunker line. Finally, Bob was finished, and about as excited as a kid with a rocket to launch on the Fourth of July!





So all that was left to do was for everybody to back off, and for Bob to let it go! We didn't have the foggiest idea of what (or who) we had hit. That wasn't the point. But it was VERY satisfying!
